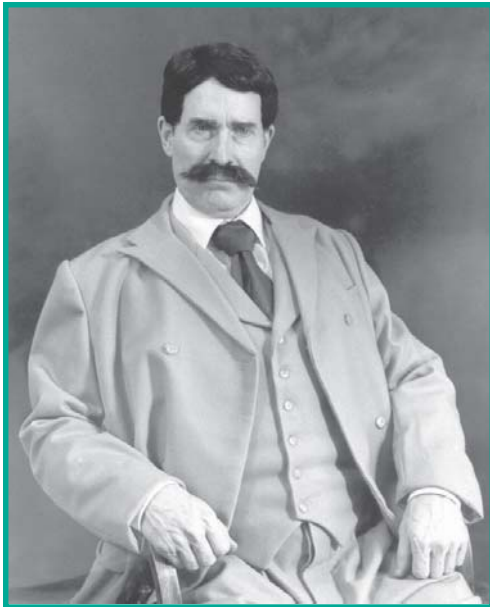

Annual Meeting features living history presenter

Thursday, Nov. 3 • 7 p.m.



“MAKE NO LITTLE PLANS” *Living history presenter R.J. Lindsey will depict Chicago Architect Daniel Burnham and speak about the Chicago Fire, 1893 World’s Columbian Exposition, and several of his buildings.*

Join the Friends of the Library at their annual meeting and listen to actor and writer R.J. Lindsey as he impersonates Chicago Architect Daniel Burnham.

The Friends are a nonprofit organization that provides financial support to the library to enhance its cultural offerings. The group also donates money to the annual Summer Reading Program.

The annual meeting will begin with refreshments and include a brief business meeting before living history presenter R.J. Lindsey speaks. “Mr. Burnham” will discuss the history of the Chicago fire and the unique stories of the buildings he designed in New York, Washington, D.C. and Chicago. There will also be a display of original 1893 World’s Fair souvenirs.

“Our annual meeting is an opportunity for members of Friends to meet each other, hear the financial report, and enjoy an interesting program,” Friends president Phyllis Carroll said.

CONSUMER TOOLS

In the market for a new car? Time to replace that leaking washing machine? Looking for a new veterinarian? The Elmhurst Public Library has many tools for consumers.

One of our newer acquisitions is a magazine called “Chicago Consumers’ Checkbook” (pictured at right).

This magazine comes out quarterly and rates local businesses based on consumer surveys. From auto repair shops to pest control companies to dentists, this periodical compares cost and customer satisfaction. (So far there are only 5 issues of this magazine.) Additionally, you can search the Chicago area Better Business Bureau (<http://www.chicago.bbb.org/search.html>).

While most of you have probably used *Consumer Reports*, you may be less aware of some other sources. “Better Buys for Business” can help a small business owner select everything from a small fax machine to a large, high-volume multifunctional copier.

When shopping for a new or used car, check our many publications that evaluate everything from quality, safety, and value,

to leg room. We have both *Kelly Blue Book* and a wide selection of *NADA guides*. While people normally think of car prices when they think of *NADA*, these books also cover RVs and campers, boats, motorcycles, and collectible cars. One can even search the *Kelly Blue Book* online to find car pricing (www.kbb.com).

Of course, we also have information about the latest technology gadgets, the most comfortable mattresses, the best refrigerators and more. In fact, Elmhurst Public Library card holders can access many *Consumer Reports* articles online from home (<http://www.elmhurstpubliclibrary.org/database>). Within the magazine databases select “Master File Premier and Newspaper Source (EBSCO).” This database has access to full text *Consumer Reports*. (You will need your 14 digit library card number to access these materials from home.)



Computer Classes

The library offers a number of hands-on computer classes in our computer lab that are open to EPL cardholders high school age or older. We have classes for those with little or no computer experience and for those who want to learn new computer applications. Fees are paid at the Information Desk at the time of registration by cash or check. Refunds will not be given. You will receive a \$10 voucher for another class if you cancel at least 7 days in advance.

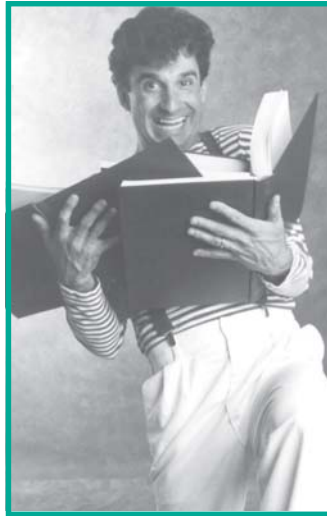

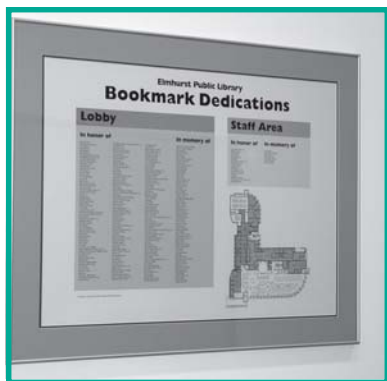
Use our drive-up window!
